Kristi is the daughter of Vicki Bishop and the late Gary Bishop and the granddaughter of Loren and Janet Brooks of Hardin, MT.



Evans Elected AHA President

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Jack Evans, Winona, Miss., was announced as the new president of the American Hereford Association (AHA) at the AHA Annual Meeting in Kansas City, Mo., Oct. 23. His goals for the AHA include taking Certified Hereford Beef® (CHB) to the next level, gaining more Hereford market share and making the Association as efficient as possible.

In 1970 Evans graduated from Kansas State University, where he was herdsman of the college's cattle division. After graduating he managed Flint Hill Hereford Ranch in Eureka, Kan.; Higgens Hereford Ranch in Nowata, Okla.; and finally EE Ranches Inc.'s Mississippi division in Winona, where he remains after 23 years.

State delegates elected Evans to the AHA Board of Directors in 2003. This past year, he was chair of the show and sale committee, and also served on the building and marketing committees. In addition, he serves on the Beef Improvement Federation (BIF) board of directors.

Evans says the Hereford-cross is the "natural answer" for commercial cattlemen looking to take advantage of the powerful and profitable effects of heterosis. He asks that Hereford breeders heavily promote this advantage in order to grow market share and to help commercial cattlemen reap the benefits of careful crossbreeding.

Hank DeShazer, Hearne, Texas, will team with Evans as the AHA vice president. DeShazer owns DeShazer Cattle Co. in Hearne, where about 400 Hereford calves are born each year and 150-200 commercial bulls are sold private treaty.

DeShazer was elected to the AHA Board in 2004. He also serves on the Hereford Youth Foundation of

America (HYFA) board, and is a member of the Texas Hereford and Texas Polled Hereford associations, as well as the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

The AHA Board also gained three new directors on Oct. 23: Marshall Ernst, Windsor, Colo.; Bob Harrell Jr., Baker City, Ore.; and Denny Hoffman, McArthur, Calif.

Ernst and his family own and operate Ernst Horned & Polled Herefords. His career also exceeds 30 years in the meat industry. He has managed both hog and cattle harvesting facilities as well as further processed and cooked meat operations. Ernst has been responsible for 35 meat-processing plants in 20 states.

He served as Wisconsin Polled Hereford Association president twice and as a director for six years. His career moved him from Wisconsin to Ohio, where his family was active in the Buckeye Hereford Association, and then to Colorado. Currently he is working with other Colorado breeders to reorganize the Colorado Hereford Association. Ernst is also co-chairman of the 2007 Junior National Hereford Expo.

Harrell Hereford Ranch, located in eastern Oregon, is a second-generation operation that was established in 1970. It is a family-run operation and consists of 300 registered cows, 400 commercial cows, an 800-head feedlot and 20 Quarter Horse broodmares.

Harrell has served as a director and as an officer in the Oregon, Washington, Northern Idaho Hereford Association (OWNI) and is past president of the Baker County Livestock Association. He served on the 2005 AHA Strategic Planning Committee and on a past AHA nominat-

ing committee. He has been asked to judge shows on the national and international level, and has had exposure as an exhibitor in the showing, coming up through the ranks of the American Junior Hereford Association. Harrells exhibited the 1984 reserve grand champion bull at the National Western Stock Show (NWSS) and have shown several carloads in the NWSS Yards.

Hoffman has been actively involved with Hereford cattle for nearly 50 years. He started his career with a 4-H project. His involvement progressed to being a herdsman, a manager and now an owner of 100 registered Hereford cows, plus a small registered Angus herd and 150 commercial cows that are used in an embryo transfer (ET) program. Hoffman Herefords is a family-run operation.

Hoffman's background with Hereford organizations includes serving on the California-Nevada Hereford Association board of directors and the OWNI board. He has been president of the OWNI and also has served on the president's council. He has extensive showing experience and, like Harrell, has been asked to judge at major cattle shows.

Retiring at the Annual Meeting were Jack Holden, Valier, Mont., 2005-06 president; Wayne Mrnak, Bowman, N.D., director and 2005-06 CHB LLC president; and Dale Spencer, Brewster, Neb., director.

AHA Releases Year-End Report

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Prices paid for both Hereford bulls and females increased dramatically during the 2005-06 American Hereford Association (AHA) fiscal year (Sept. 1-Aug. 31), pointing to the growing demand for Hereford efficiency in conversion, hardiness, fertility, longevity and disposition.

In sales reported in the *Hereford World*, the AHA's official publication, the average bull price increased 8.4% from \$2,894 last year to \$3,137 this year, while the female average grew by a remarkable 25.4% from \$2,362 to \$2,962. Combined, the bulls and females brought \$412 more per head on 2,895 more animals.

"The AHA finds itself in a strong, viable position within the seedstock industry," says Craig Huffhines, AHA executive vice president. "The economics have been excellent for Hereford breeders, as prices for bulls and females steadily rise and as the market share for Hereford genetics takes on new heights this decade."

Even though prices are rising, commercial customers can be confident that Hereford still means value. The fertility and rugged structure of the Hereford bull provides for extra years of breeding power, reducing annual bull purchases. On an Angus cow, his F1 son commands top dollar in the sale barn and feedlot, and his daughter excels in temperament and mothering ability. She produces year after year, and with hybrid vigor delivers more pounds of marketable product.

This "Hereford-influenced" value continues to grow, as producers increasingly submit data for the betterment of the breed. The AHA year-end numbers demonstrated breeder commitment to progress in carcass traits, with an 86.9% jump in reported ultrasound measurements (backfat, ribeye area and intramuscular fat) over the past five years.

Registrations, transfers, cow inventory and memberships were also noted at the year's end. Despite drought conditions, Huffhines says the stats show a "steady, stable trend" for the Hereford breed.

As the second largest breed association in the U.S., the AHA reported 69,344 registrations, 34,352 transfers and a cow inventory of 106,120 head. Contributing to these numbers were 3,462 adult members and 2,283 junior members.

The top 10 states for registrations in descending order were Texas, Nebraska, Kansas, South Dakota, Oklahoma, Missouri, Montana, Illinois, Idaho and Georgia.

On the retail side of the Hereford business, Certified Hereford Beef (CHB) LLC reported sales of 37.9 million lb. of CHB[®] from 258,626 certified carcasses.

"CHB is now a veteran in the branded beef arena," says Rob

Ames, CHB LLC executive vice president. "Last year was about refreshing those elements of our marketing program that speak to the consumer and diversifying into food service."

Hereford Verified, the AHA and CHB LLC traceable program for Hereford-influenced calves, harvested its first cattle during the 2005-06 fiscal year (5,614 head). CHB LLC has awarded bonuses of \$11,228 to producers who didn't have to retain ownership to get data and money back on their calves.

Looking to the future, Huffhines says, "The AHA is positioning itself to continue to add value to the commercial industry through significant investment in feed efficiency and hybrid vigor research."

Over the next few years, the AHA will document the economics of using Hereford genetics on Angus-based cow herds. "We know the advantages hybrid vigor delivers," Huffhines says. "And we're going to document them in 'real-world' commercial operations, to quickly prove to those who are not using Hereford bulls that they are leaving a lot on the table."
